

His research has been and is currently funded by numerous intramural and extramural sources, including the NSF, NIH, and the Maryland Department of Health. Dr. Desjardins teaches numerous courses at Hopkins and supervises a variety of master's and PhD students and postdoctoral fellows. Dr. Desjardins is the Special Issues Editor for Health & Place, editorial boards for Wellbeing, Space and Society, and Cartography and Geographic Information Science (CaGIS). He also serves on the organizing committee for the upcoming 2024 International Medical Geography Symposium and is the United States representative for the International Geographical Union & Commission on Health and Environment.
